Overview of Performers



Koji Kakinuma, calligraphist

Koji Kakinuma is an award-winning Japanese calligrapher whose work extends beyond the conventional category of calligraphy. His notable works include large-scale calligraphies using an enormous brush and a new method he developed which he named Trancework. Kakinuma has performed and exhibited in numerous sites around the world including the Metropolitan Museum, NY, Washington D.C. Kennedy Center, Philadelphia Museum, London County Hall, and the Earth Celebration – KODO.



Tetsuro Naito, Japanese drum (Taiko) performer

Originally a member of the renowned Japanese *taiko* group Kodo, Naito became a solo musician in 2002 and has since collaborated with various musicians such as DJ Krush, Soul Flower Unicorn, and Yoshida Brothers. Naito aims to spread and further develop the art of Japanese *taiko* through his teaching activities and performances across a wide variety of genres.



Kaoru Watanabe, Shino-bué (bamboo flute) and taiko player

Kaoru Watanabe, a former member of the Japanese *taiko* ensemble Kodo, is a practitioner of various Japanese transverse bamboo flutes, the *taiko* drum as well as Western flute. His music can be best described as an ever shifting blend of the folk and classical traditions of Japan with contemporary improvisational and experimental music.



Shogo Yoshii, Kokyu (Japanese violin) and taiko performer

Shogo Yoshii was a member of *taiko* performing arts ensemble Kodo for 10 years and performed almost 800 concerts. In 2010, he joined the musical ensemble of "Babel (words)," choreographed by Sidi Larbi Cherkaoui and Damien Jalet, receiving many awards, including Lawrence Olivier Awards. He left Kodo and started his solo activities from 2013.
